FROM OUR CHAPLAIN

TIMES PAST!

Whenever you travel to locations not in your close proximity to your daily life many new ideas and environments greet your eyes and mind. Once out of New York and New Jersey, I had the chance once again see what the rest of the United States looks like. During my vacation I drove down to this year's 39thers Reunion located in Norfolk, Virginia. Because I drove down by car I had the chance to pass through many small towns and suburban areas along the rural scenic route I traveled through.

The alternate route I took was lined with homes that looked like they were abandoned for many years. These homes were laced within the framework of large plantations and farms that sprawled across all of Virginia. Seeing them decaying made me very sad, and to see so many of them in such disarray and decay brought me to think about who lived there. Abandoned homes have a story in themselves, but it is the lives of those who lived there that intrigued me. Were these people workers in the plantations, or farms? Where did their families and children go after leaving the area? These are the questions that I pondered for sometime as I drove down and back again to New York.

Moreover, what really amazed me were the Churches that found prominence along the route. Not one or two in a mile or so, but more than I could count while driving. The majority of the Churches were Southern Baptist, with schools and playgrounds attached to them. However, there were a plethora of smaller churches built in the no-frills Baptist style. At one major intersection in particular there was a very

large Baptist Church on the left side of the intersection called Morning Star Baptist Church, and the street that crossed in front of it was named Pleasure Boulevard. Who knows were that road once or still leads to? How ironic! Maybe that is why they built a Church there in the first place.

Furthermore, with all these houses left to rot, and there inhabitation long gone, who worships in the cornucopia of local Churches I passed? Times have long gone when these churches were packed with "God Fearing" people, who brought their troubles to the door of God's House. Who were these people? Well simple people struggling to make a life for themselves with the sweat and blood from their brow. Many saw the journey they undertook as impossible and unattainable without the trust and love for God in their hearts. What propelled them forward through the trials and tribulations of life were the many hymns they sang which instilled hope in their hearts along with His ever present mercy. These are very powerful hymns that can move an individual to endure hardship of immense proportions, while simultaneously filling them with a love of God and humanity at the same time.

Finally, today this fervent expression of the faith has slowly dwindled and our Churches and religious institutions are filled only a few times a year by the faithful. Similarly, like the many communities I drove through which were at one time vibrant and flourishing parishes are now ghost towns, but for us they are dying not for the same reason. Why? Because we do not have a high rate of attrition due to an outward movement away from a particular location as the people in Virginia who traveled to find work, but for ours it is a lack of interest.

One of the comments I hear all the time is, "what good does going to Church do for me? Will it help me make money or live a care free life without trouble or sickness?" This is what religion has been reduced to. What can it do for me here on earth? If people continue to think this way they have lost what the simple farmers and share croppers of the back roads of Virginia understood, that He is always with us and looking after us in health or sickness, in drought or abundance, in good times or bad. This is the grace that fills our world and He continues to sustain us no matter what our condition is because He loves us. Amen!

Dallas/Fort Worth, Texas


